INTRODUCTION

EU-MIDCAP is a peer-to-peer Facility supporting partner-country authorities and civil society organisations, as well as regional bodies, to design and implement their migration and forced displacement management systems in line with international standards and to develop their cooperation with the EU and its Member States. Funded by the European Union (DG INTPA) and co-implemented by a Consortium led by the International Centre for Migration Policy Development (ICMPD) together with UNHCR, the authorities of Belgium (through Enabel), Czechia, Poland, Spain and Sweden, as well as UNICEF, EU-MIDCAP provides rapid, tailor-made assistance upon request.

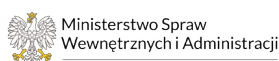

WHAT ACTIVITIES ARE POSSIBLE?

- › Support for the assessment, revision or design of national/local/regional legislation, policies and strategies, and services on migration and forced displacement;
- › Support for advising on or evaluating the implementation of policies and strategies in those areas;
- › Training sessions, study visits, and seminars for partner countries on migration and forced displacement (including through the provision of limited quantities of equipment as training tools);
- › Support on data production and management;
- › Support in designing awareness raising/information campaigns at national and regional level;
- › Provision of expertise to second and mentor national officers;
- › Capacity building in the areas of migration and forced displacement (e.g. development of manuals, curricula, handbooks, SOPs, guidelines, etc.).

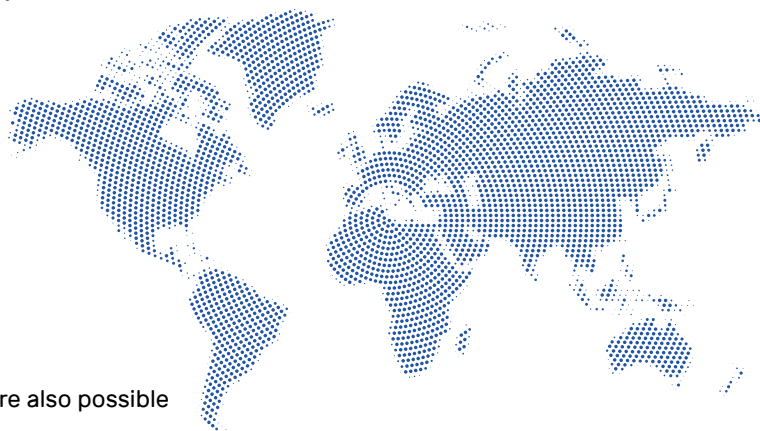
WHO CAN REQUEST EU-MIDCAP SUPPORT?

Requests may come from **countries covered by DG INTPA** in:

- › Sub-Saharan Africa
- › Central, South, South-East Asia
- › The Pacific region
- › Latin America and the Caribbean

Eligible entities include:

- › National and local public authorities
- › Regional organisations and entities
- › Civil society organisations
- › Joint requests from multiple institutions are also possible



HOW DOES EU-MIDCAP WORK?

EU-MIDCAP offers short-term technical expertise responding to requests of assistance introduced by the partner countries. How does it work?

1. REQUEST



- › Complete the request template (available in multiple languages);
- › Send it to EU-MIDCAP team directly or via the relevant EU Delegation or the European Commission (DG INTPA's Unit in charge of Migration and Forced Displacement);
- › DG INTPA will assess eligibility and relevance, considering other support provided, feasibility, and alignment with EU and partner country priorities.;
- › If positive, approval by DG INTPA.

2. ACTION FICHE



The request is translated by the Consortium into an Action Fiche detailing all the elements of the Action, in consultation with DG INTPA and the requesting partner country.

3. EXECUTION



- › Once the Action Fiche is approved by DG INTPA, its implementation can start;
- › Experts are mobilised by the Consortium to deliver the expertise;
- › A results-oriented report is produced to explain to what extent the objectives have been met, including possible recommendations.
